Introduction

1. *The Chairperson, Mr. Marc Blondel*, opened the meeting by welcoming all the members of the Committee, as well as staff of the ILO Turin Centre.
2. He remarked on the importance of the International Training Centre as a Centre of the ILO and not of the United Nations. He underlined that although the UN reform process (“One UN”) might try to transform the multilateral system, the ILO should maintain its identity and tripartite approach. The main objective of the ILO was the protection of workers and that should be recalled to employers who wanted to receive equal financial treatment to the workers without taking into account the fact that they were the principal beneficiaries of many Programmes at the ILO such as Enterprise Development, Corporate Social Responsibility and Employment. In the context of employers’ demands for more funds for their activities, he pointed out that there were many more labour organizations in the world than employer organizations, and they needed more support from the ILO. He called for greater compliance with the ILO mandate to foster social dialogue in more reliable and transparent ways. He then invited the ITC's Deputy Director to speak on behalf of the Centre.
3. *The Deputy Director, Mr. Dario Arrigotti*, welcomed the members of the committee and conveyed the Director’s apologies for not being able to attend the meeting. He reassured the committee that he would transmit the concerns raised by the Chairperson to the Director. He also confirmed that all possible efforts were being made to keep the flag of the ILO above all other flags on the campus. He also gave an overview of the Centre’s activities in 2007: more participants, more activities and participant days, and greater participation by social partners in the Turin Centre’s activities.
4. *The Chairperson* thanked the Deputy Director and made two main points. First, he did not consider the outsourcing of services a suitable management approach. He cited the fact that consultancy contracts had been issued to members of the Governing Body. Second, the Secretariat of the Workers’ Group had not been involved in the organization of the EU-ILO funded “High-level Tripartite Dialogue on the European Social Model in the Context of Globalization”. He reiterated the importance of maintaining the tripartite spirit of the ILO. He then gave the floor to Mr Dan Cunniah, Director, ACTRAV, ILO Geneva.
5. *Mr Cunniah* told the meeting that ACTRAV attached great importance to the activities of the ITC-ILO and the Programme for Workers’ Activities in Turin, and also contributed financially to the Centre. Efforts had been made to expand the Programme in all regions, and over the past few years the Programme had expanded its services for Central and Eastern Europe. He recalled the Labour Education Symposium, which had been held in 2007, and asked that its conclusions be circulated at the Centre. He pointed out that the International Trade Union Confederation (ITUC) was putting more emphasis on the training of labour educators. He called for training in the methodology of training union trainers.
6. *The Secretary of the Workers' Group, Ms Anna Biondi*, welcomed all members of the Committee and the ITC-ILO colleagues present at the meeting. She said she was interested in the accounts of the Centre as presented by the Deputy Director and asked for more information about the Centre's adoption of the euro as its currency of business.
7. She reiterated the importance of the core values of the ILO, underlining that officials of the ILO should be loyal to the ILO Constitution. Though the pressure for implementation of the “One UN” programme has lessened, the idea of bringing together organizations and rationalizing was still there, and so efforts should be made to maintain the uniqueness of the ILO.
8. She drew the attention of the Committee to the fall in nominated participants on bi-tripartite courses in 2007, on the one hand, and, on the other hand, to an increase in worker participants

in other courses, who had not been nominated by the Secretariat of the Workers' Group. She asked how these people were selected, by whom, and whom they represented. She stressed the importance of having the Secretary of the Workers' Group select, and/or be consulted on, all nominations.

9. *The Secretary of the Committee, Marc Bélanger*, emphasized the fact that the ITC was the educational centre of the ILO, and that concept should be reinforced in all activities. He thanked the staff of the Programme for Workers' Activities for the work they had done in 2007. He pointed out that the Programme was the largest international labour education school in the world. He then presented the activities the Programme had held in 2007.
10. He also informed the audience about the Trade Union Information System (TUIS), which had been requested by the ACTRAV Symposium on Labour Education. The database would contain the names and addresses of labour organizations, contact information for many of their leaders and a record of participation in Turin Workers' Activities courses. It would be available on the Internet. It was now open only to the Secretary of the Workers' Group and the ITUC because they were involved in its design. He emphasized that updating the information was the key to its effective functioning.
11. *The Secretary* concluded his presentation by listing the subjects on which the Programme would focus in 2009 and proposals for 2010. The Committee accepted his proposed plans for courses in 2009 and 2010, with some amendments.
12. *The Chairperson* complimented and thanked the Secretary of the Committee for his presentation. He also encouraged the staff of the Programme for Workers' Activities to speak during the discussion.
13. *Mr Graziosi* confirmed that the Programme for Workers' Activities was by all standards the Centre's largest Programme, a Programme which was growing in both quantity and quality, one which had been experimenting very much with new ways of training, new technology and matching training to the conditions, needs and demand of trade unions.
14. Concerning the financial dimension of the Centre's work, the impact of exchange rate fluctuations between the US dollar and the euro would make 2008 a complex year financially, because it would be more difficult to balance the budget and generate a surplus, as had been done for the past 15 to 20 years. For exchange rate reasons, in 2007 the Centre had accumulated savings on Italy's annual voluntary allocation, which needed to be used and spent in 2008, partly in order to reach the ambitious financial target and balance the 2008 budget.
15. An additional allocation of 500,000 euros had been earmarked for the existing facility to promote participation by workers' and employers' representatives in the Centre's mainstream courses.
16. He continued by saying that cost-sharing activities with recipient organizations were a condition for survival for the Centre, but they had also made it more demand-driven, more attentive to quality, and more attentive to sustainability. This should be combined with proper representation of social partners, ILO priorities, and access to training for the poorest countries.
17. He reassured the Committee that, whenever funds were accessible to the Centre directly from donor agencies, a very significant share went to social partners, and to the Workers' Activities' Programme in particular. Forty per cent of the whole 2008 Italian allocation to the Centre was being used to finance participation by workers' and employers' representatives (60% workers, 40% employers). The problem was that the Centre had very limited direct access to donor funds.

18. *The Chairperson* commented on the availability of Italian funds due to exchange rate differences. He stressed that the situation was not permanent. He also stressed that the role of the Secretary of the Workers' Group was to represent all workers. She had that legal responsibility and therefore could not be ignored. He reiterated the importance of having a session on ILO standards in all courses.
 19. *Mr Cunniah* thanked all the colleagues in the Programme for Workers' Activities in Turin for the work they had done in 2007 and for the work they were doing in 2008. He also complimented the Programme for having already implemented some of the recommendations of the Labour Education Symposium on organizing courses for trade union educators and the development of trade union education materials.
 20. He underlined the need to make some adjustments to the Programme. As an objective for the near future, he suggested increasing the number of regular courses, especially since the regular courses had been reduced to three weeks.
 21. As a point for reflection during the discussion of the Programme for 2009-2010, he suggested regional integration processes: how could trade unions be helped to understand the implications of regional integration processes and make sure that the social dimension, especially the respecting of labour standards and workers' rights, was incorporated?
 22. *The Chairperson* asked the Programme to analyse and compare the number of participants in each region, including previous years, in order to detect the regions where there was greatest need.
 23. *Mr Adyanthaya* complimented the Centre for its good performance in terms of both quality and quantity. He thanked the staff of the Programme for their work. He expressed his appreciation of the new training materials which had been developed by the Programme and called for more. He requested a comparison between participant days last year and this year. He expressed concern over the distribution of participants by region, in particular the number from Asia and the Pacific. He called for more resource people from Asia. He also stressed the need to increase the tripartite focus of the Turin Centre.
 24. *Ms Goulart* expressed her satisfaction with the report produced by the staff of the Programme for Workers' Education. She expressed concern at the lack of training for trade unions at a lower level and called for more training materials. She also pointed out that there was no information on the age of course participants and that there was a need to train young leaders. An effort should be made to invest more in training unionists from Latin America. There were not enough courses in Portuguese. She suggested combining Brazilian participants with participants from Portuguese-speaking Africa. She also proposed strengthening the training of trainers programme.
 25. She expressed worry at the growing tendency within the ILO to ignore the value of social dialogue and tripartism.
 26. *Ms Benitez, an activity manager in the Programme*, explained that the increase in participants from Latin America was due to a project on social security, which held activities at the national level. This made it much easier to group larger numbers of participants. Though distance learning was very highly developed in Latin America, it did not have a negative impact on face-to-face training. With regard to the age of participants, *Ms Benitez* pointed out that the Programme for Workers' Activities selected participants up to 45 years of age.
 27. She pointed out the problem of tripartite activities at the Centre, saying that the Technical Programmes often did not consult the Programme for Workers' Activities when curricula were developed. There was a need to develop a culture that enabled joint implementation of tripartite

and bipartite activities. This would enrich the content of the activities. There were many bipartite projects in which the Programme was not involved at all.

28. She also informed that she had been appointed ACTRAV's labour education specialist in Latin America and the Caribbean. She would continue to work closely with the ITC-ILO and its Programme for Workers' Activities.
29. *Mr Kumar, an activity manager in the Programme*, said that within the budget allocated to the Workers' Education Programme for Asia, the policy had always been to have as many countries and unions as possible represented. Nevertheless, the proportion of participants from South Asia was probably higher. He pointed out the problems in eliciting nominations of women participants.
30. *Mr Dia, an activity manager in the Programme*, informed the Committee that the Arab Regional Programme, for which he was responsible, had relatively few activities. There should be a reinforcement of the activities in this region. It would be valuable to have a person representing the Arab Region. As regards regional integration processes, he informed the Committee that the Cotonou agreement had always been a cross-cutting issue in the courses run at the Turin Centre. He said that, in the framework of globalization, a link between Latin America and Africa should be made. The interregional dimension should be encouraged. For the first time, two courses, for English-speaking and French-speaking Africa respectively, had been run in parallel. The same would be done for African researchers in 2008.
31. He also called for courses on communications.
32. *Ms Toth, an activity manager in the Programme*, thanked the Secretary of the Workers' Group and Mr Cunniah for supporting the European activities of the Programme. More than 50 per cent of the activities held for that region were funded through European Union projects. She drew the attention of the Committee to the fact that there was internal Centre competition because projects were presented at the same time. The ITC-ILO should try to avoid such competition through better coordination.
33. *The Chairperson* thanked everybody for their input and clarification. He also thanked Ms Benitez for the work she had done and for what she would do in the future. He reiterated the importance of developing the Programme in the Arab Region.
34. On the internal competition for presenting projects, he stressed that integration between the Centre and the ILO was needed in order to avoid such competition. He called for more clarification of the issue.
35. *Ms Biondi* thanked all colleagues who had taken part in the discussion. She expressed her appreciation of the new training publications presented but pointed out that they covered only a small core of the issues. She asked that more training material be developed on other issues.
36. She stressed the importance of having the Trade Union Information System database up and running, in order to have an overview of who, and how many participants, had attended courses. She agreed that it should be managed from Turin.
37. She expressed appreciation of the Centre's efforts to give workers' representatives as much access as possible to training, but they should be made in a broader context, by discussing and developing joint curricula. It was in this context that the discussion about the projects should be set. She stressed the importance of those projects having ILO-compatible content, which very often was not the case.
38. She called for a deeper discussion of the Decent Work Country Programmes and how the Turin Centre could be linked to them.

39. With regard to ILO staff training in Turin, she asked for information on how much other departments in Geneva had been training their staff in Turin.

40. *The Chairperson* thanked everybody and closed the session.

Conclusions

41. Committee consensus was reached on the following points:

- a. Strengthening and consolidating the activities in the Europe Region, by adding a regular core course for Europe on training of trainers.
- b. Creating a permanent Europe Desk position within the Programme for Workers' Activities.
- c. Further developing and expanding activities in the Arab Region. An additional activity for 2008 was approved. Support for implementing this additional activity could come from the Region itself or from ACTRAV in Geneva.
- d. Supporting the integration of the Centre into the ILO.
- e. Continuing the development of a Centre policy on bi-tripartite courses with increased representation of constituents and mutually agreed curricula.
- f. The need to set up an objective set of criteria with which to define bi-tripartite courses and make the best use of the Central Fund. A review of the fellowship process should be held in 2008 in order to improve the process in 2009.
- g. Consulting, and securing approval by, the Secretary of the Workers' Group on nominations for Centre activities other than those that come under the current Social Partnership Facility.
- h. Increasing regular courses in 2009 and 2010 from 11 to 12. An additional regular course for the Arab Region should focus on freedom of association or international labour standards.
- i. Developing the Trade Union Information System (TUIS) database to make it an instrument for organizing labour education and other activities. The database should be kept permanently up to date.
- j. Having the Programme for Workers' Activities involved in the design and implementation of tripartite projects at the Centre.
- k. Extending the agreement with the All-China Federation of Trade Unions for another five years with the clear understanding that the focus should be on freedom of association and collective bargaining.
- l. The Programme for Workers' Activities should provide the Committee with a full list of ILO staff training activities held at the Centre.
- m. Making an analysis of the total financial contribution by ACTRAV Geneva to the Centre available to the Committee in 2009.

-
- n. Increasing activities in Portuguese by bringing together participants from Lusophone Africa and Brazil.
 - o. Developing a curriculum on communication for trade unions.
 - p. Developing a coherent policy on presenting projects to the European Commission in order to avoid competing proposals from the Centre.
 - q. Developing a strategy for covering core topics, such as labour relations and social security issues with all regions. This could be done through interregional courses. The Centre should consider meeting the cost of interpretation in order to implement this new interregional approach.
 - r. Planning a more interregional approach for the Programme in 2009 and implementing it in 2010.
 - s. Increasing the number of resource persons from Asia and the Pacific.
 - t. Using more technical staff from the Centre as resource persons in the Programme's activities, drawing on a new facility for compensating staff time.
 - u. Further improving coordination between the field and Turin. There should be more work at regional level.
 - v. Follow-up activities in the Regions on labour education methodology training.
 - w. For 2009, it was agreed to hold a core course for Central and Eastern Europe on training of trainers and keep only one interregional course on TU rights and international labour standards.
 - x. For 2010: an additional labour education methodology training course in Arabic, a core course for Central and Eastern Europe, and an interregional course on labour education.
 - y. Regional RBTC should be considered as a contribution by the Regions to the Programme for Workers' Activities. No conditions or priorities should be dictated by the Regions for the use of this contribution.
 - z. Welcoming the role of PRODEV as a means of finding alternative funding for workers' activities. Avoid overlap with the fund-raising that ACTRAV has already started in the regions.
 - aa. The Committee recommended that no department of the ITC should run courses on issues on which there was no tripartite consensus within the ILO.
 - bb. Continuing and expanding the development of new training booklets and other training material. Covering issues other than the current core issues.

Opening remarks

1. *Mr C. Renique, Chairperson*, opened the meeting and welcomed the Director of the International Training Centre. He added that *Mr A. Peñalosa, Secretary-General of the International Organisation of Employers*, regretted not being able to participate in the meeting due to the imminent opening of the International Labour Conference.
2. *Mr F. Eyraud, Director of the Turin Centre*, warmly welcomed the members of the Committee and emphasized the importance of such meetings for an exchange of views. He underlined the growing importance that the Programme for Employers' Activities had assumed inside the Centre after *Mr De Koster's* arrival in 2006.
3. *Mr Renique* presented the agenda.

The agenda was approved.

Report on the Employers' Activities Programme, 2007

4. *Mr Renique* gave the floor to *Mr De Koster, Manager of the Employers' Activities Programme*, who introduced the Employers' Activities team. He then reported on activities conducted by the Programme in 2007.

In terms of **output**:

- Training quantity. *Mr De Koster* stressed the importance of the increase in the number of employers' representatives (700, + 80%) participating in the Programme's activities.
- Training material. *Mr De Koster* stated that resources had been invested in 2007 to diversify the training materials. He presented the new training materials developed in 2007 and listed a number of other training packages in progress which will be ready by the end of 2008.
- Training quality. *Mr De Koster* presented the improvements in training quality from 2006 to 2007. He stressed that an important improvement had been registered in the quality of materials.
- Relevance and needs-orientation. *Mr De Koster* informed the Committee that needs-orientation had been boosted by using annual surveys of national employers' organizations (EOs) to identify priorities and needs.
- Visibility and cooperation. *Mr De Koster* explained the strategy for increasing the Programme's visibility. He followed up by describing the enhanced cooperation with other units of the Centre, with ACT/EMP Geneva, with the International Organisation of Employers (IOE) and with national employers' organizations.

In terms of **input**:

- *Mr De Koster* sketched a financial picture of the Programme. In 2007, it had doubled its funding. Special attention had been given to diversifying funding.
- a. *The Chairperson* expressed the Committee's overall satisfaction with the results of the Programme for Employers' Activities in 2007.
- b. *Mr Eyraud* was given the floor. He congratulated the Employers' Activities team on the results. He underlined the importance of an approach in line with that of ACT/EMP Geneva and invited the Programme to strengthen collaboration with ACT/EMP specialists in the field, including collaboration on resources decentralization.
- c. *Mr Retournard, Director of the Bureau of Employers' Activities*, was given the floor. He underlined that Decent Work Country Programmes (DWCPs) were the main vehicle for ILO technical support to countries and stressed the importance of tripartism as one of the pillars of DWCP. He said that the Turin Programme (and, more generally, the entire Turin Centre) together with ACT/EMP Geneva should fully understand the role that training could play within the DWCP framework.

Work plan for 2008 employers' activities

5. *The Chairperson* invited *Mr De Koster* to present the work plan for 2008 employers' activities.

Mr De Koster presented the objectives for 2008:

- Increase training
- Increase funds for training
- Invest in training material and innovation, and start to develop blended training and e-learning platforms
- Increase quality and further strengthen links with ACT/EMP Geneva, the IOE, national EOs and other units of the Centre.

Mr De Koster explained that the Employers' Activities team aimed to run 43 training activities with a good regional balance and would develop new training material.

Mr De Koster followed up by describing the challenges for 2008.

- Resources - He welcomed Ms Schmitt's joining the Programme, but underlined that its staff were under heavy pressure in coping with the programmed activities. *Mr De Koster* hoped that funds would be made available to recruit a new Professional category staff, who would be in charge of activities for Latin America. He highlighted the urgent need for more secretaries as well.

- Employers in other ITC-ILO activities – *Mr De Koster* suggested looking for ways to use the Central Fund more effectively to increase participation by employers’ representatives in training activities organized by other units of the Centre.
- Improve collaboration. *Mr De Koster* stated that improving the collaboration with ACT/EMP Geneva and ACT/EMP specialists in the field remained a priority.

As regards long-term challenges, *Mr De Koster* said that the Programme was building a portfolio of activities with a coherent, possibly modular approach. There were four types of training:

- **Standard courses** - “The Effective Employers’ Organization” covered basic rules of governance, strategy, lobbying and revenue-building.
 - **In-depth courses** - Normally three-day courses which focused on one of the themes covered by the standard courses.
 - **Cross-cutting skills** - Courses often organized in collaboration with Workers’ Activities colleagues, on skills which fostered the capacity of social partners to be effective in bipartite and tripartite meetings.
 - **EOs and policy areas** – These courses aimed at strengthening the capacity of EOs to interact in policy areas.
6. *Mr Eyraud* was given the floor. *The Director* first highlighted the considerable efforts which the Centre was making to improve its training. This was done partly by training ITC experts to become high-level trainers themselves. Enhanced training quality would justify the price of the Centre’s training.

The Director went on to explain the fund-raising strategy. He stressed that the Centre was a real enterprise in an uncertain and unpredictable market, which meant it needed a good fund-raising strategy to stabilize and increase income. He pinpointed the Centre’s initiatives concerning donors to reinforce the financial basis of the Centre. He also thanked the Employers’ Group for their strong support in this endeavour. The objective was to achieve a stable flow of revenue, which was an essential condition for recruiting and retaining good staff.

The Director repeated the importance of intensifying collaboration with ILO headquarters and, in particular, ACT/EMP on capacity-building projects. The Centre had much value to add to such projects by taking responsibility for training components.

7. 4.2 *Mr Renique* stressed that appropriate means in terms of human and financial resources were needed to reinforce the Programme and seize the opportunities to develop it further.
8. 4.3 *Mr Retournard* congratulated the whole team for the results achieved and joined the other members of the Committee in requesting adequate, balanced resources for the Programme for Employers’ Activities.

9. *Mr M'Kaissi, Employer Member of the Centre's Board*, congratulated Mr De Koster and the Employers' Activities team for the results, and thanked them for concretely addressing African employers' need to meet the challenges of globalization.

Discussion of employers' participation in ITC-ILO activities (other than the Programme's own)

10. *The Chairperson* reported on the discussion that the employers' group had on employers' participation in ITC-ILO activities (other than the Programme's own). He mentioned the following problems:

- Some activities were not demand-driven.
- Course length.
- In many cases, content was not relevant to employers' organizations.

He suggested ways to stimulate participation by employers' representatives:

- Investing money in other ways than fellowships.
- Shorter courses, in line with EO needs.
- Spending part of the budget on workshops with innovative, tripartite-oriented themes.

He added that the Employers' Committee had given a mandate to *Mr De Koster* to formulate a short-term proposal on using the Central Fund in a way that was more relevant to employers.

11. *Mr Eyraud* took the floor. He explained that Central Fund had been created to strengthen tripartism and its improvement was always under discussion.
12. *Mr Graziosi, Director of Training Programmes at the ITCILO*, explained that the Central Fund had been created to provide programme managers with an incentive to develop courses relevant to a tripartite or bipartite audience. He explained that the total amount in the Central Fund had been increased and that, with the help of ACTRAV and ACT/EMP, the Centre tried to identify courses relevant to the social partners and assign fellowships to help them participate.

Mr Graziosi stressed the need for the Centre to boost activities by using Italian funds in 2008. This was a way to make good use of the surplus resulting from exchange rate fluctuations. He said that additional resources had been set aside to develop pilot projects with bipartite and tripartite subjects (for example 'green jobs' and migration policy).

13. 5.4 *Mr Renique* said that there was a need for better communication about pilot courses and for more flexibility in the use of the Central Fund.
14. 5.5 *Mr Muia, Regional Adviser for Africa, International Organisation of Employers*, supported the Chairman's proposal.

15. 5.6 *Mr Retournard* thanked the management of the Centre for the institution of the Central Fund for tripartite activities and suggested developing bipartite training activities.
16. 5.7 *Mr Eyraud* said that he would welcome suggestions that could improve the effectiveness of the Central Fund. He mentioned the idea of developing new joint (ACT/EMP- ACTRAV) projects and that of producing new blended courses.

General considerations by employers on the development of the Centre in 2007.

17. 6.1 *Mr Renique* mentioned the problem of regular posts and project posts. Given that many people were still on project-based posts but activities were quite stable, he suggested introducing more regular posts and asked the management of the Centre for a concrete proposal to be presented at the November Board meeting.
18. 6.2 *Mr Eyraud* explained that the management of the Centre was studying the issue in collaboration with the HRS in order to resolve the contractual status of the staff in that position, and that proposals would be put to the Board of the Centre in November.

Other items arising

19. 7.1 *Mr Renique* reported that during the preliminary meeting, the Employers' Group had pointed out that more time was needed to discuss all the items on the agenda properly. The ETC meeting took place in an uneasy period (just before the International Labour Conference). He therefore proposed finding a more appropriate date for the following year, possibly not just before the International Labour Conference.

Closing remarks

20. *Mr Arbeloa, Employer Member of the Centre's Board*, informed the Committee that this was his last ETC meeting, due to his imminent retirement. He thanked the Centre for its activities and expressed his gratitude to all the colleagues on the Employers' Committee for this long and rewarding experience.
21. *Mr Renique* thanked Mr Arbeloa for his contribution to the work of the Employers' Training Committee for many years. He then asked that the main conclusions of the preparatory meeting of the Employers' Committee be added to this report. He called the meeting to a close at 1 pm.

Conclusions of the Employers' Group

22. In terms of training activities the performance of the Programme for Employers' Activities in 2007 was excellent both in quantity and quality.

The work plan for 2008, which aims at increasing the number of training activities, at developing new training material and innovation and at increasing funding and funds diversification, is approved.

The Employers' Training Committee wishes to congratulate the staff of the Programme for the results which have been obtained and incites them to continue progressing further.

The Employers' Training Committee also notes the high potential of the Programme for the employers' constituents and for donors. The Employers' Training Committee is convinced that further support by the management, with the allocation of new resources, will be beneficial for the Employers and for the development of the Centre.

23. The Programme has successfully realized its business plan, but more could have been achieved with an increase in resources and funds.

The Committee notes with satisfaction that a reinforcement of the professional staff of the Programme, on a project based financing, will be made possible; it also looks forward to the implementation of solutions for the strengthening of the secretarial staff.

In spite of this progress, the Employers' Training Committee reiterates its fundamental remarks on funding: the Employers' Programme remains under funded. Compared with other programmes, a wide gap remains and this gap hampers the advancement of the Employers' Activities Programme.

The Employers' Training Committee maintains its request that a programmed phasing in of investments by the management of the Centre is necessary to support further growth of the Employers' Activities Programme.

24. The Employers' Training Committee deeply examined the participation of Employers' representatives within the global participation figures of the Centre and the mechanisms to support it, via the so-called Central Fund, which should stimulate the participation of social partners' representatives in other ITC ILO programmes.

It takes note of the recent decision to increase the budget available for this support.

The Committee requests that in the future social partners, being the main beneficiaries of this budget, will be consulted beforehand.

The Committee also examined alternatives to the present use of the Central Fund to enhance the employers' participation in the other ITC ILO programmes. It invites the management to discuss and consider some different solutions to assure that the contents and conditions of delivery reflect Employers' training needs and constraints, whilst respecting the overall objective of enhancing the tripartite character of activities.

The Employers' Activities Programme is called upon to collaborate more closely with other Units of the Centre.
