



Background

For more than 20 years the International Training Centre of the ILO, the University of Turin and the University Institute of European Studies, in collaboration with other world-class universities have been offering a shortened version of this Master as a postgraduate course under the name “International Trade Law”. In recognition of increasing demand for higher levels of specialization in the fields of contract law and international trade and coinciding with the decision to establish the Turin School of Development (as a unique mechanism for delivery of joint UN-academic programmes), it was decided to expand and upgrade the programme’s learning contents to a Level 1 European Master as of the Academic Year 2010-2011.

UNCITRAL - a historical partner of the post-graduate course – endorsed the new Master and accepted the status of a full partner as of 2010. Besides, such international organizations and renowned universities have increasingly contributed to the Master and delegated distinguished faculty members to join the Scientific Committee and/or to participate in programme delivery, as WTO, UNCTAD, UNIDROIT, EU, ICC.

The Master Programme provides comprehensive coverage of International Trade Law, including Public International Law, Private International Law and International Dispute Resolution. It focuses on International Organisations (WTO, UNCITRAL), International Contracts, with emphasis on recent developments and the increasing complexity of the laws of global trade. In addition the Master incorporates a dedicated module on International Dispute Settlement, Arbitration and Mediation.

The Master has an international and diverse Faculty composed of professors of law, practitioners (lawyers, in-house lawyers) and distinguished officials from international organisations imparting to the participants not only the legal knowledge and skills for negotiating trade and related contractual issues

but also the practical skills that are necessary for a successful career in the field. The combination of academic and legal practitioners is a distinctive feature of this programme which enables smooth integration of theory with practice.


Teaching modality includes: distance learning, workshops, moot courts, seminars and case studies where students actively participate to the class and contribute to the learning process. Participants will benefit from the support and involvement of Module coordinators and tutors who will assist and advise them throughout the learning period.



Objectives

The learning objectives of the master programme are:

- advancing legal knowledge in the field of international trade law and transnational contract law and related provisions of public and private international law;
- enhancing competencies for comparative legal analysis
- providing fundamental tools and competencies needed to deal with the complex reality of international commercial transactions from an international perspective and in particular with respect to:
 - Negotiation and Drafting of International Commercial Contracts;
 - Interpretation and Management of International Commercial Contracts;
 - International Dispute Resolution and Arbitration.

Detailed Curriculum of the Master Programme

The programme is an intensive course of one full year duration structured in three different parts as follows:

Distance Learning Phase

During this first part participants will be provided with essential preliminary information needed to acquire the prerequisite entry level knowledge in the disciplines. In this preparatory phase the students will study:

Module 1: Actors

- Actors
- Multinational Enterprises (MNEs)
- State-owned enterprises (SOEs) and Sovereign Wealth Funds (SWFs)

Module 2: Sources

- Regionalism and Plurilateralism v. Multilateralism in Trade and Investment treaties
- Harmonization and Diversity in International Contract Law
- The Regulatory Interaction of Treaties and Contracts: Investment in Land

Module 3: Thematic Workshop on Energy (2016-2017), it may vary for each edition

- International Contracts for Natural Resources
- Energy in International Investment Law

During this phase of distance learning, participants will have access to an on-line platform, through which they will be given the material, while receiving advisory support from a dedicated tutor.

Within 2 weeks of arrival in Turin, participants will sit for a written examination intended to assess the level of knowledge attained by the students during the distance learning phase.

PART III - FINAL DISSERTATION -

Final Essay

The final phase consists of the submission of a final essay or a case analysis by the end of October 2018 (30 pages approximately) supervised by an advisor and by the Module coordinator.



Participants profile

Our students come from many different countries and our programme is proud of supporting the diversity of the class.

The master programme targets:

- recent university graduates, preferably with some relevant working experience, who intend to work in the field of international tradelaw e.g. in law firms, corporations’ legal departments, European and international organisations, academic or research institutions;
- professionals, law consultants, practitioners, and managers wishing to expand their knowledge in the field of negotiation of international contracts;



Entry requirements

Applicants must have successfully completed a first level university degree of at least 3 years’ duration, either in law, economics, political sciences, business administration or equivalent.

The validity of non-Italian degrees must be recognized under Italian law and regulations.



Language, duration, venue

Language

The master programme is entirely delivered in English. Knowledge of the English language is a pre-requisite and must be proven in the application form with supporting documents

Duration

The programme lasts one full year with the following timetable:

- distance learning: from 30 October 2017
- to 4 February 2018;
- residential phase: from 5 February 2018 to 8 June 2018;
- preparation and submission of the Master Thesis: the outline of the dissertation is to be presented in Turin by 8 June 2018 and it is to be completed by the end of october 2018.

Participants who will pass the prescribed examinations will be awarded with a First Level Master Degree in International Trade Law issued by the University of Turin with the cooperation of ITC-ILO and Uncitral.

Venue

The residential phase of the programme will be held at the campus of the ITC-ILO in Turin, Italy. Class attendance is compulsory.



Scholarships

A limited number of partial fellowships may become available from sponsors in order to facilitate the participation of deserving candidates who are unable to meet the full tuition fees.

Participants are therefore expected to finance their participation as much as possible. The admission criteria will take into consideration the participant’s self-financing potential as well as his/her educational and professional profiles.



Fees and applications

The tuition fee is **Euro 8,000**.

The fee includes:

- programme development and management ;
- teaching equipment, training materials and documentation;
- use of training facilities and support services.

Board, lodging, travel expenses, transports and personal expenses for the period in Turin are not included in the cost of participation fee.

The cost of accommodation (bed and breakfast) at the ITC-ILO campus during the 18 weeks' residential face-to-face part of the programme is 5,550 Euro. Meals are excluded and must be paid directly by participants in accordance with consumption.

Participants may seek off-campus accommodation like in university residences or private apartments which may be less costly.



Application deadline

Applicants interested in participating in this programme should complete and submit the application form available on the website (<http://tradelaw.itcilo.org>), together with the requested documents, not later than the 30th of April 2017 (to be screened and evaluated for the 1st round) or the 31st of August 2017 (to be screened and evaluated for the 2nd round).

The partial fellowships may only be awarded after all applications (both first and second round) are submitted.

Important: only complete application forms will be considered during the candidate's selection process.



The ILO Turin Centre's facilities

Located in Turin, the city of the 2006 Winter Olympic Games, in an attractive park on the banks of the River Po, the Centre's campus provides a congenial environment in which to live and study.

It contains 21 pavilions with fully equipped modern classrooms, conference halls and meeting rooms fitted out for multilingual simultaneous interpretation, a computer laboratory, and a computerized documentation centre linked to various data banks.

The campus has 210 single fully serviced bedrooms, 66 double bedrooms and 12 suites, each with private bathroom, telephone, 24h free internet access and flat screen television. It also has:

- a reception desk open 24 hours a day
- a restaurant, a self-service canteen and a coffee lounge, all catering for international dietary needs
- a bank
- a travel agency
- a laundry service
- a post office
- two gyms
- facilities for outdoor sports (football and tennis)
- a medical service

Social events are regularly held both on and off campus, so that participants from different cultural backgrounds can make the most of a stimulating international environment.
