Founded in 1404, the University of Turin is one of the oldest and most prestigious academic institutions in Europe. It is a leading Italian public university with an international reputation for high-quality teaching and research. We offer our 83,000 students a comprehensive range of innovative courses and are a reliable partner for teaching and research programmes. Our aim is to provide our students with the academic competence required to meet the contemporary challenges of a global society.

At UniTO, the international dimension encompasses over 25 double and joint degree programmes, the Marco Polo and Turandot projects for Chinese students, 25 English-language courses, over 150 joint-supervision doctorates and two international PhD programmes, as well as 1,500 Erasmus+agreements for student, trainee, researcher and teacher mobility.

The University of Turin is part of UNITA – Universitas Montium, an alliance of 10 universities plus 2 partner Universities which, in 2020, took a significant step towards establishing a European university system. Since then, a total of 65 alliances have now been established in an extensive process of expansion based on economic, social and environmental sustainability. The University of Turin prioritises research, both fundamental and applied, blending skills in:

Engineers, architects and urban planners have been trained at Politecnico di Torino for over 160 years with rigor, integrity and high-level standards. This long-standing and continually evolving tradition has established the University as one of the top twenty technical institutions in Europe for education and research in Engineering, Architecture, Design, and Urban Planning. Today, Politecnico di Torino hosts more than 38,000 students and a faculty of over 1,000 members.

In recent years, our society is undergoing a significant transition towards sustainability, driven by global challenges such as climate change, the energy crisis, and health emergencies. The Turin School of Development (TSD) has once again demonstrated its academic distinctiveness and global reach in the 2024–2025 academic year. What sets the TSD apart is not only its international orientation, but its commitment to providing practical, multidisciplinary learning that equips professionals with the skills required to operate effectively in increasingly complex policy and development environments.

Across our portfolio of seven Master's programmes, our learning community represents a rich cross-section of professional and cultural backgrounds. The diversity of this cohort—balanced by gender, age, and regional representation—serves as both a strength and a reflection of our global mandate. These are not traditional students: they are lawyers, engineers, policy professionals,

development practitioners, public procurement experts, and social innovators. Their presence validates the continued relevance of our programmes to real-world demands.

Our academic model is distinctive: it combines the intellectual depth of graduate-level study with the applied orientation of professional training. This year's participants engaged with frontier subjects such as **AI and law, sustainable transitions, digital governance, inclusive trade, social innovation, and occupational health**, supported by a network of **283 faculty members** drawn from over 80 institutions. This diverse faculty—from academia, the UN system, and professional bodies—ensures that our teaching remains anchored in both theory and practice.

The goal of our Masters' Programmes

We have strengthened our emphasis on flexibility and responsiveness: hybrid delivery models, new thematic modules, and expanded use of expert-led webinars reflect our goal of making learning accessible, adaptable, and immediately applicable. Several programmes have been recalibrated to address pressing global challenges, including procurement in crisis settings, technological disruption in policymaking, and workplace safety in high-risk environments.

The TSD is not designed to compete with traditional universities. Rather, it fills a critical gap: it translates academic insight into concrete competencies for use in professional contexts. That is why our partnerships—with the **University of Turin, Politecnico di Torino**, and numerous UN and international organizations—are built around complementarity, not duplication.

Looking ahead, the planned launch of the Master in Technologies for Sustainable Transitions in the Global South is emblematic of our forward-looking approach. It reflects a conviction that advanced, context-sensitive education is essential to managing structural change—particularly in vulnerable and fast-evolving regions.

At the ITCILO, we view training as an instrument of transformation. Through the TSD, we bring this ethos into the postgraduate domain: creating a space where academic excellence, international cooperation, and professional development converge. I am proud to witness the continued impact of this model and grateful to the many individuals and institutions who make it possible.

The goal of our Masters' Programmes

The Masters are intended for:

- university graduates from developing and developed countries who intend to work in the fields of development, governance and international trade;
- professionals in the public and private sectors, UN, EU, and multilateral agencies, foundations and NGOs.

Requirements:

- successful completion of a first level university degree (of at least three years' duration);
- fluency in English (evidence of English language fluency required).

Career opportunities:

TSD graduates are well prepared to meet the entry profile requirements of international companies, governments, UN agencies and the NGO sector. They are ready to assume responsible jobs of the 21st century in the fields of development and international trade.

Participants are exposed to a mix of academic study and professional practice that are the "best fit" for diverse cultural backgrounds.

Fellowships:

A limited number of partial fellowships may become available through contributions by public and private sponsors in Italy on a competitive basis. These partial fellowships are intended to supplement the financial capacity of participants from developing and transition countries who would otherwise not be able to pursue their studies without external financial support.

Faculty:


The faculty of the Turin School of Development is comprised of a mix of renowned university professors, selected from a network of premium partner universities across the globe, along with senior practitioners from the UN System and key professional bodies. The faculty includes 283 leading professors, professionals and UN experts from over 80 different institutions.

Master in International Trade Law

The Master aims to provide an in-depth understanding of the main legal issues concerning international commercial contracts, from contract drafting to dispute resolution, with emphasis on recent developments and the increasing complexity of contract law, including the impact of new technologies and the role of compliance for MNEs.

Moreover, it covers the key international institutional and legal frameworks for international trade and investment, and incorporates a dedicated module on international dispute settlement, international commercial arbitration and transnational domestic litigation.

This Master has been designed for recent university graduates who intend to work in the field of international trade law, in law firms, corporate legal departments, governments, international organizations, and academic or research institutions.

Law consultants, practitioners, and young managers wishing to expand their knowledge in the field of international trade law had also taken part to the courses.

As we look back on the past year's milestones, we are thrilled to report that the 2024-2025 edition of the Master has exceeded our expectations. Our traditional learning model of intensive lectures at the ITCILO Campus in Turin continues to be a cornerstone of our programme, but we have also added several new thematic areas, including AI&LAW, supply and value chain challenges, electronic commerce, and other related topics.

These new thematic areas have generated significant interest among our participants, with the use of new technologies in international dispute resolution systems being a particularly hot topic. We are delighted to see our participants engaging with these new areas and applying their newfound knowledge to real-world scenarios.



Our Master Programme remains committed to providing a diversity-oriented approach and a global perspective, and we are honoured to have had the opportunity to engage with a diverse group of participants from around the world. As we move forward, we will continue to provide our participants with a comprehensive understanding of private law, public law, and international dispute resolution, as well as encouraging them to think critically and creatively about the challenges and opportunities presented by the rapidly evolving global landscape.

The Master in Management of Development offered by the Turin School of Development in partnership with the University of Turin

and with the technical contribution of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) is designed to equip professionals in the development sector with the necessary skills and knowledge to deal with the evolving challenges and global issues. The Master is one of the longest-standing master's programmes at the School and over the years has attracted more than 600 participants from more than 80 countries.

The learning programme provides a singular opportunity to explore the theoretical, conceptual and operational frameworks for managing development from a multi-disciplinary perspective. The module integrates theoretical insights with practical applications in different areas: Environment and Sustainability; Development, Inequality and Growth; Human Development, Human Rights and Migrations; Local Development

and Participation; Governance and Democracy; Result-based Management and Project Management.

The current edition of this programme has maintained its appeal by offering a hybrid structure, combining a theoretical component delivered remotely with a practical one conducted in person. The continued attraction of participants from all over the world reaffirms the programme's significance within the Center's training offerings.

Upon programme completion, participants will possess an interdisciplinary grasp of development theories and processes, enabling them to critically apply theoretical knowledge to daily work experiences in the development field. Additionally, they will master the ability to conceptualise, formulate, and proficiently manage development projects.





Master in Occupational Safety and Health



Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) remains a critical priority for both public and private organizations worldwide. In developed and developing nations alike, the rapid pace of technological advancement, alongside the continued presence of unsafe or environmentally hazardous working conditions, has heightened the focus on creating safer and healthier workplaces while fostering a renewed culture of prevention.

This evolving context has led organizations to increasingly seek qualified OSH professionals who can drive these changes—yet finding individuals with the right mix of skills is not always straightforward. Becoming a safety and health expert requires a multidisciplinary approach to education. The OSH profession demands a comprehensive academic foundation, covering both the physical sciences (such as medicine, physics, chemistry, and engineering) and the social sciences (including behavior, motivation, and communication), as well as a strong grasp of management principles.

Our Master's Programme offers a unique combination of the international training experience of our organizing partners and robust academic knowledge in the field of OSH.

The residential phase of the 2024–2025 edition took place from January through

early April 2025. As part of the curriculum, students participated in study visits to various innovative companies, and we are currently undertaking a renewal process for some of the resource persons involved in the residential modules.

This programme is intended for participants from both developing and industrialized countries. It is specifically tailored for hygienists, physicians, chemists, engineers, inspectors, practitioners, and officers—those who hold a university degree but have not previously specialized in OSH—who are currently working or aiming to work as OSH professionals.

Upon completion, graduates will possess the necessary competencies to effectively manage occupational health and safety in the workplace.



Master in Public Procurement Management for Sustainable Development



The Master in Public Procurement
Management for Sustainable Development
explores the legislative, regulatory,
organizational and managerial foundations
of a modern public procurement system.
It aims to help make up the current deficit
in qualified human resources and enable
procurement professionals to cope with
the challenges of regulating, executing
and monitoring public procurement in
an economic and socially responsive
manner while mitigating adverse
environmental impact.

Strategies and instruments for embedding social, environmental and human rights at the relevant steps of the procurement process/supply chain are few of the key topics of the Master, together with the promotion of corporate social responsibility through public procurement.

Learning about the execution of the procurement process for goods, works and services (including innovative contracting modalities like public-private partnerships and e-procurement through AI aid and assistance) is at the core of the Master's outcome whose participants are procurement trainers, procurement advisors and practitioners, local government bodies and public expenditure supervisory bodies as well as recent university graduates who intend to work in the field of public procurement or public expenditure management.

In response to the evolving challenges posed by current crises, the 2024-2025

edition of the Master's curriculum was enhanced with new lectures and case studies focused on designing and conducting procurement operations in emergency and fragile situations. The Programme now emphasizes agile and smart design as key skills and competencies for participants to develop. In addition, logistics and supply chain issues related to more effective implementation with a focus on sustainability and inclusiveness. Red flags in performance-based Auditing procurement under emergency, the efficacy and Value for money of procurement, the use of rated criteria, the need for a better and strategic planning in public procurement, and the way forward in renegotiations in public private partnerships (PPP). Since 2021, the Master Programme introduced weekly webinars with expert lecturers in the Distance Learning phase, in addition to the interactive techniques and tutor based briefings, which were already in place. This approach has been highly valued by the participants.




